Private business, social enterprises and charities appear to be the default whereas co-ops have a significant role to play in housing, transport, community services, energy, food production, social and health care and other areas. The movement has a huge opportunity to stimulate, encourage and develop co-operation in the next few years (and indeed longer) but particularly as the Labour government is committed to doubling the size of the co-op sector. Many communities in the North are not well served by public services and co-ops can enable local people to create self help solutions. Co-operation is a flexible approach which enables people to create their own jobs, communities to save/create services and/or to take over assets and small/micro businesses to collaborate. I am keen to work with Co-op party colleagues to promote co-operation.
